Statement of Need: COVID-19: Taking Aim at the Black Community

Since January 2020, COVID-19 has spread throughout the United States, and has devastated the Black community

- Black Americans represent 13.4% of the US population (or approximately 42M)
- Black Americans are four (4) times more likely to be hospitalized and three (3) times more likely to die from COVID-19 compared to White, non-Hispanic persons.¹





Statement of Need: Health Disparities: Taking Aim at the Black Community

"When White America gets a cold, Black America catches pneumonia."

Unequal social determinants → Racial health disparities → Deadly outcomes ...but why?

- Long, established distrust for the public health system
- Lack of healthcare access, proper education, diet, exercise and smoking cessation create preexisting conditions which supports the worst outcomes for COVID-19
- Black Americans often work in jobs that involve crowded conditions or high contact with other people
- Unvalidated but equally harmful, are rampant conspiracy theories that are being propagated around COVID-19



Statement of Need: Health Disparities: Taking Aim at the Black Community

UNEQUAL TREATMENT

CONFRONTING RACIAL AND ETHNIC DISPARITIES IN HEALTHCARE "The conditions that thrust Black communities into a vulnerable state are rooted in a healthcare system that mirrors the systemic and structural inequalities in American society... they have led to racial disparities in morbidity and mortality rates from chronic illness for decades."



Statement of Need: Critical Impact of Economies Reopening

Weighing the desire to open the economy versus adequate testing and contact tracing

- The populations most vulnerable are being put at a significantly higher risk
- Vaccine distribution is slow and will most likely be unavailable to the Black community until mid 2021
- Creates a gap that requires urgent and aggressive action







Statement of Need: Vaccine Distribution and the Black Community


Once available, safety concerns, lack of trust will hamper distribution

- Half of Black adults said that they would probably or definitely not get the vaccine even if it were deemed safe and effective (49%)
 - Safety concerns/side effects listed as the first reason (39%)
 - Distrust in the health system, govt., or vaccines in general (35%) as second
- One-third (33%) of Black adults are not confident at all that the vaccine will be distributed fairly

Statement of Need: Addressing the Pandemic in the Black Community

Prioritize COVID-19 testing, care and contact tracing while establishing a trusted infrastructure for vaccination

- ~ 90 percent covered through private insurance, public health (Medicare, Medicaid), and/or "safety net" programs
- Focus on the ~10 percent (4 million) that have no coverage¹ or access to COVID-19 testing with a goal of testing 400,000 in one year
- Aggressively communicate to entire population the need for COVID-19 precautions (masks, social distancing, etc.), testing and ultimately vaccinations

"Unfortunately, before we see February [2021], we could be close to 450,000 Americans have died from this virus." – U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Dec. 2, 2020




Proposal: COVID-19: Leveraging Proven Strategies

Build upon the successful public health approach in the Black Community to address the HIV/AIDS Epidemic

The basic tenets for interventions in communities in crisis⁵ are as follows:

- Ensure the initiative is owned and trusted
- Use of specific influencers can mitigate prohibitive conspiracy theories
- The community invests in the program's success, and they can see a positive long-term outcome to continue the actions and behaviors necessary





Goals and Objectives: Reshaping the Future of Health in Black America

We intend to achieve the following key objectives:

- Awareness and Education raise awareness and educate the Black community on COVID-19 and other health disparities
- Testing and Vaccination proactively engage the community in a COVID-19 campaign to reduce the spread of the virus and save lives
- Trusted Infrastructure establish in our churches an infrastructure of trusted health navigators to support their respective communities working in tandem with United Way
- Scale establish a sustainable model that can expand to address a multitude of health disparities and be replicated in other communities



The Pilot focuses on five (5) major U.S. cities over 12 months

- New York, Newark, Atlanta, Detroit, and Washington, D.C.
- Establish a trusted network of 50 churches across five cities to conduct testing and vaccine distribution – putting in place a permanent infrastructure to address health disparities
- Execute in partnership with United Way, Resolve to Save Lives and Quest Diagnostics
- Conduct data research and evaluation

- The Black church is the oldest and most trusted institution in the Black community – has the power to influence and drive change
- Serves as the proving ground to incubate local community organizations to educate and deliver health support services

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Creating a new workforce in partnership with the Black Church

- On the local level, recruit Black Church Public Health Navigator (BCPHN)
 - Trained and certified on COVID-19 precautions and testing protocols
 - Work with clergy to establish testing dates and maintain standardized logs
 - Conduct church outreach ministry to raise community awareness
- Establish Black Church Public Health Navigator Supervisors (HNS)
 - Establish and manage the BCPHN medical activities
 - Educate and train local BCPHN on standard contact tracing protocols
 - 1 FTE per 10 church clusters

Put in place a trusted infrastructure within the Black Church to address vaccine distribution, diabetes, stroke, cancer and other health disparities




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
